The September 2011 Meeting

Guild Vice-President Dianne Looker opened the meeting at 7:00pm and mentioned why Don Moore wasn't able to attend and asked people to pass on their support for Don and Maureen.

Dianne then introduced the next Shape Challenge, an Ogee, and went over good and not so good shapes. You are to bring your piece in for the December meeting in a bag or some means to prevent people from seeing it until the appropriate time. There is no size limit but it must conform to this shape. Please see the following pages for more info.

Gordon Marshall spoke about the segmented class he is going to hold. It will be a four-hour session at his house where he will go over the basics of segmenting. He can accommodate only 5 people because of his shop size. He will provide design tips and take a turning from the beginning to the end, but you will not make a piece yourself. This will be held on Saturday the 29th of October, with the time yet to be determined. The first five to contact Gordon are in and if there is enough interest Gordon may do another session this winter.

Robert Atkinson, Doug McGuire and Dianne Looker spoke about their experiences at this year AAW Symposium in Minneapolis-Saint Paul. There is something there for everyone with the different demonstrators, exhibits and trade show.

The Show & Tell followed with quite a few members participating:

Alan Hunt did more on boxes and he has taken a course on metal casting for making rims and feet for his future pieces.

Stuart Taylor spoke about a bowl under construction from a mystery wood which was found on the beach at Taylor's Head. This was given to him complete with barnacles, it had also been burnt and surprisingly it had no worms in it. He brought in a jar with shavings in it and smelled strongly of turpentine. When the piece is finished he will bring it in.

Glenn McCarron brought in a picture of a segmented bowl he made for his daughter to give as a wedding present and a one-piece segmented bowl he had made as a backup in case the segmented one didn't become a finished piece.

Richard Ford spoke about 2 shallow bowls he made and the tool he came up with to undercut the inside rims.

Gordon Marshal spoke about different segmented pieces he had made this summer.

Robert Atkinson spoke about a couple of cherry bowls that showed how wood moves when it dries. The rims had been darkened with ink to accent this and one had the foot turned offset to provide a different look.

Dale Rayner spoke on a couple of bowls he completed, one made of Oak and the other one made of Ash.

Doug McGuire spoke about one piece where he had tried some texturing he had seen Al Stirt do at Minneapolis and found it didn't go quite the way he thought it would. It seems that while cutting with and across the grain the tool doesn't behave quite the same. Doug also had a box with texturing on it.

Dianne Looker spoke about her cruise in Norway with such turners as Rolly Munro (her drinking buddy) and his unfinished demo pieces she bought by silent auction, Richard Raffan and Bonny Klein with bone pieces she had done on a rose engine that Dianne couldn't resist buying. She also showed a knife and case that she had made on the cruise. At 8:50 we had to bring her to a close and have a draw for some pieces of wood.


The winners of the raffle were: David Richards, who won a piece of Oak, David Duggan who won a piece of Maple and Gordon Murray who won a piece of Plum.

The Shape Challenge Bowl Project #3: Ogee



The template for Project#3: Ogee, comes from Richard Raffan's book, Turned Bowl Design, page 117. Ogee is a shape consisting of a concave arc flowing into a convex arc, forming an S-shaped, or cyma curve. "Cyma" comes from a Greek word meaning "wave".

1. Turn a bowl using the above as a guideline. You do not need to follow the template exactly, but make the curve smooth and continuous and make it this general shape.
2. Your choice: wood, the treatment of the rim and the bottom of the foot, and the finish.
3. Bring your bowl to the December meeting in a bag.


Raffan cautions that "things are more complicated as curves combine to flow into one another. The form is too heavy if the line moves away at too shallow an angle from the surface in which it sits. An ogee rarely sits well on its own – it needs to be lifted off the surface." (P. 62).


Notes on the Ogee Form

from Richard Raffan, Turned-Bowl Design, page 62 - 63:



An ogee can combine drastically different curves – tight little curls with long almost flat arcs, or identical reversed curves. The options are limitless. *A* above is a good basic form: The tight arc of the foot flows into the full portion of the curve and reverses to create a shallow arc, which flows out and up in a wonderful open form. This arc can be extended, as in *B*, to create a much larger bowl before the curve drops below the horizontal line of the rim. And you can cut it off at almost any point and still have a good curve.

The same cannot be said about the profiles in the following group:



Profile *C* suffers from a weight problem – the curve sags and the base is too wide and the foot too shallow. The foot and lower curve of *D* are better, but it is too full on the rapid reverse to the rim. The upper curve needs to be shallower, as at *E*, to eliminate the quirkiness. The initial descent from the rim in *E* is fine, but the reverse is not quite full enough, which makes the curve into the foot too long. The top half of *E*, in combination with the bottom of *D*, would make a good bowl. The dotted lines show how each form can be improved.

Remembering Bob Hamilton

I regret to report that Bob Hamilton passed away August 26.

Bob was one of the few remaining original members of the NWG still active in the Guild. While Bob was slowing down a bit in the last few years, longer-term members will remember Bob as a very active member of the Guild. He served on the Executive for many years, he demonstrated at meetings, and he was always ready to help out with such things as organizing our booth at the local wood show (when there was still a local wood show) and doing demonstrations at other events.

At Bob's memorial service two members of the local Chiefs and P.O.'s organization gave a presentation. They talked about how some very longstanding naval traditions (dating back thousands of years) have fallen by the wayside, but how they would like to help renew these traditions. One tradition, used when a sailor died at sea, was for him to be sewn up in his hammock or a piece of sailcloth. The last stitch by the sail-maker would be through the person's nose (a very delicate place), to ensure that the person wasn't faking death to avoid work! Another tradition was to place a coin on the person's chest before the sail-maker finished, the coin being used to pay the ferry man on the River Styx. While the Chiefs were unable to exactly carry out either tradition, they did leave a coin (with a sailing ship) on the urn containing Bob's ashes. Bob's ashes were, not surprisingly, in an urn Bob turned himself.

There was also a display of Bob's turnings at the reception after the service. Having known Bob since the club was formed, it was easy to immediately recognize some of the turnings as Bob's work. It is interesting how turnings can be so recognizable as belonging to one turner.

I carpooled to NWG meetings with Bob for many years, and we had a lot of enjoyable discussions about wood turning and many other things. He called me over this summer, saying he had something he wanted to give me. He was (to my surprise) emptying out his shop, and gave me some wood he wasn't going to use. He also gave me some wood to be raffled off at NWG meetings, which I will be bringing in this fall. He then asked me if I knew anyone who might like to buy his lathe. Coincidentally, I have a friend who has been thinking about getting started in wood turning for quite a while, so I called her up. The following week I went over to Bob's house with her and her husband, and Bob showed them what he had for sale. Generous to the end, Bob gave away many tools and jigs along with the lathe for what can only be described as a superb price.

The photo above is from Feb 7, 2009 when Bob received a plaque, "In appreciation for your dedication to the advancement and promotion of woodturning through the Nova Woodturners' Guild".

While I was saddened to think Bob wouldn't be doing any more wood turning, and I knew that Bob's health wasn't 100%, we did make plans for me to give Bob a ride to the September Guild meeting. It was a bit of a shock when I heard about his death. I will certainly miss car-pooling with Bob and seeing him at the meetings.


