

The Official Journal Nova Woodturners' Guild Season 6! Feb 19, 2001

The sixth meeting of our sixth season will be Monday, Febuary 19 at 7:00 PM in the Carpentry Shop at the NS Community College at Leeds Street, Halifax.

January meeting:

We welcomed another two new members to the club at the January meeting. This brings us up to the high forties, which is considerably more members than we've had in our six years of existence.

Thanks to **Denton Ford** for donating \$40 (proceeds from a turning of his sold at the Atlantic Wood Show) to the NWG. And, continuing his hot streak, Stuart Taylor once again brought in a sizeable chunk of cherry for the raffle; this month's winner was **Richard Dumas.** The raffle earned \$26 for the club's kitty.

The main presentation of the meeting was given by **Steve Zwerling** on the topic of sharpening. As we all know, trying to produce nice turnings with dull tools is an exercise in frustration. Unfortunately for us, sharpening turning tools is something of a more difficult problem than that experienced by our brethren who work flat pieces of wood. Steve brought in his grinder and some jigs and sharpened a variety of types of tools. But just as important as knowing how to get a keen edge is knowing what shape of edge is desired. Using a bowl **Andrew Watson** brought in for show and tell, Steve showed how having gouges with different bevel angles can be very useful for getting access to different parts of a bowl. He also showed how to improve the **Lee Valley** skew-sharpening jig, whose inherent design flaw limits you using it with long skews; a small bit of 1/4" plywood works wonders here!



Steve sacrificed a bit of his high-speed steel by deliberately grinding a groove in one of his gouges in order to show that even with a jig, some intelligence is still required on the part of the sharpener. While gouge-grinding jigs help you maintain a consistent angle, the grinding time on any one spot must be carefully monitored so that the overall desired shape is maintained (or obtained). Steve demonstrated the use of a black felt-tip marker for sharpening; if you "paint" the surface to be ground before applying the tool to the grindstone, you can check for black on the tool after grinding to make sure you ground the entire surface.

Future Meetings:

As a result of some questions generated from **Warman's** "show and tell" box at the January meeting, Warman has agreed to do a demonstration on turning a box at an upcoming meeting. He will concentrate on the aspects of reverse-chucking the bottom and lid; there are many ways to do this, but Warman will show how he uses hot-melt glue for this. Warman will be showing this in March or April, as schedules permit.

We are always open to suggestions for meeting topics. If you have any suggestions, please pass them on to an executive member. Even better, if you have some favourite thing that you wouldn't mind talking about and/or presenting to the group, that would be very appreciated.
