SUMMER BBQ – August 17 (Rain date August 18)

Location: 2248 White Rock Rd., Gaspereau. Dianne Looker's place. Phone (902) 542-3897.

Directions from Hailfax. Take Highway 101 to the Valley. Exit at Exit 9. There is a ramp that ends in a roundabout. Go three quarters of the way around the roundabout (over the highway) and almost immediately there will be a stop sign at a T junction. Then you will be following the signs to the Gaspereau winery.

This will involve you turning right and following a windy road for about 10 km. After about 5 km of the windy road there is an S curve - a sharp right and almost immediately a sharp left - which you should take. If you fail to take the left you will go down a little hill, you'll see Reid's Meats on your left and a bridge. Stop. Turn around and go back up the little hill and turn right so you are on the road you should have been on....

After about the full 10 km. there will be a Shell service station and a convenience store on your left. Then a bridge (over the Gaspereau River). The road curves up a slight hill to the right. The road continues to curve but there is a road on your left. Turn left onto White Rock Rd. and find a parking spot. My house is a big white house with a car port, red doors and black shutters on the south west corner (#2248). You can park at the winery across the street if you like.

Alternate route: Take Exit 10 from Highway 101; go into Wolfville. At the first (and only) stop sign (Tim Hortons on the right; police station on the left), Gaspereau Avenue, turn left. Go up the hill, past the yellow flashing light. Under the highway. Down the hill. The road itself will make a 90 degree turn left; immediately after that is White Rock Rd. on your right. Turn onto White Rock and park.

Meeting Notes

Pre-meeting Demo: Don Moore presented a slide show on how he turns hollow forms with difficult cherry burls. He uses wooden 'bridges' attached with hot melt glue to span gaps or openings that make parts of the burl unstable. He also attaches a plywood ring using hot melt glue to give the wheels of his steady rest a 'track' to run on. This allows the steady rest to hold the piece securely while he's hollowing the inside of the burl.

President Gary Landry Opened the meeting at 6:45 pm; with 37 members present

Visitors: Bruno Losier

Announcements:

- The Executive is proposing purchasing a chuck to add to the Tool Library. This would allow members to borrow the chuck and try it out, without committing the Talon chuck currently with the Guild demo lathe.
 - o It would have spindle adaptors for various common lathes
 - The members present agreed to spending up to \$300 for this
 - o The Executive will explore options and report back.
- We are still looking to confirm a location for the summer BBQ. **Dianne Looker** and **Ray Bollman** have offered their place in the Gaspereau Valley. The date would be Aug 17th. Dianne is happy to have the BBQ somewhere else if anyone closer to Metro would like to host the event.
- The Executive is proposing that the Guild offer a scholarship for a member to attend the 2019 *Women in Turning (WIT) eXchange*, Sept 5-7th at the Arrowmont Arts and Crafts School in Gatlinburg, Tennessee. If a member wishes to attend, the Guild would reimburse \$300US / \$400 CAD of the costs to cover the registration. The Secretary will email all of the female members to make sure they are aware of this opportunity.
- VP **Bill Maes** reported that the nomination slate is full for the upcoming election of Executive members at the June AGM, with the exception of the Newsletter Editor position. Members are asked to consider taking on this role and let Bill know if you are interested. [Editor's note: Norm Jolivet has agreed to take on the newsletter thanks, Norm. But it appears the Competition Chair is not firmed up yet.]
- **Gary Landry** asked for volunteers to act as Auditors to review the Guild finances at the upcoming AGM. There were no volunteers so we will appoint auditors at the AGM.
- Gary Landry announced that the Executive wishes to flesh out a set of criteria and guidelines for judging the Mandrel category in the annual competition. A number of competitors have commented that there is often little feedback from the Judges in this category. The suggestion was made that it would be good to review the criteria for all categories. It is important not to make the judging process too complicated, yet find a balance so competitors are receiving useful feedback. The Executive will consider the various points raised at the August Executive meeting and report back to the membership with a more concrete proposal.

Main Presentation: Epoxy Inlays and Embellishment with the Bandsaw - Dianne Looker



Dianne showed off a number of bowls and platters with contrasting inserts of wood and coloured epoxy and demonstrated how she creates the blanks for these decorative and distinct pieces. Dianne learned the process from Ontario turner and wood artist, Marilyn Campbell.

Start with your Design

- Sketch out your desired design on paper
- It is important to avoid very tight turns – they are hard to cut with the bandsaw and also to make the contrasting

inserts that fit well

- Avoid too many lines coming together at the same spot as this will create a large void that will be difficult to fill with epoxy
- Don't have the points of inserts too close to the edge of the blank as you will lose some of the edge making the blank round on the lathe and this will tend to cause the lines and points to widen and be less attractive



- Avoid symmetry —it is very difficult to achieve and maintain when sanding the pieces and assembling the blank and any error will show up clearly due to the symmetrical pattern.
- Once you are satisfied with your design, photocopy the design and adhere it to your stock with spray adhesive.
- You can keep costs down by using more expensive exotic woods for the smaller inserts, rather than the larger blank.

Cutting the Blank Parts

- Cut out the pieces using your bandsaw, trying to maintain smooth flowing cuts as you go. This will reduce the amount of sanding needed
- Sand all cut edges to remove saw marks. This can be done with a spindle sander for the inside (concave) curves and/or a disk sander for the outside (convex) curves. Remember that sanding will tend to slightly change the shape of pieces so be careful not to sand too much.
- Once the blank is cut and sanded, it can be reassembled and used to mark paper templates for the inserts. Glue the templates to a contrasting wood of your choice and cut out the inserts, then sand as above.
- It is important to consider grain orientation when laying out the inserts.


• Label all parts to keep track of placement and alignment. Also mark the ends of the inserts on the blank parts so that they can be properly aligned when assembling the blank with the epoxy.

Assembling the Blank

- Make sure you wear latex or nitrile gloves when working with epoxy as it is toxic when uncured.
- Use vinegar (double strength or 10% is best) for cleanup of uncured epoxy
- Epoxy does not stick to waxed paper so lay down a strip of waxed paper to protect your work surface
- Dispense the epoxy resin into a cup. Dianne uses West SystemTM epoxy. Add the required amount of slow acting hardener and mix well as per the manufacturer's instructions.
- Add a filler powder to thicken the epoxy to the consistency of peanut butter
- Colour the epoxy using a small amount of acrylic or oil paint. Try to keep track of how much paint is used as you will need to mix up a matching batch later to fill any bubbles or voids. Black is the easiest colour to match. Adding the paint will tend to thin the epoxy slightly. Thoroughly mix the colour into the epoxy until it is uniform. Mix slowly to avoid trapping air bubbles in the epoxy.
- Spread a thick layer of epoxy on one side of each mating surface, starting from one side of the blank and working



across. As each piece if coated, press it against the matching piece with just enough pressure to fully seat the epoxy – you don't want a lot of squeeze-out



- Once fully assembled, let the blank sit overnight to let the epoxy fully cure
 - Rough turn the form to your desired profile
- Mix another batch of epoxy and fill any bubbles or voids that appear after the turning. This is why it is important to get the amount of paint accurate so that you will get a good colour match when filling the bubble voids. Let this cure overnight again.
- Finish turn and sand the piece, then apply your desired finish.



Yogi Gutz won a nice walnut bowl blank; **Calum Ewing** added a turning book to his library; **Leo Westhaver** also took home a book and **Bruno Losier** won a bag of pen blanks.

-a large bowl in Maple with a stained back and pyrography decoration on a broad rim. This piece had started out as a demonstration piece for a wood colouring workshop that Gordon taught at Lee Valley.

-a tall vase in Maple with pyrography decoration of butterflies in various sizes




Don Moore also presented two pieces:

-a turned and carved piece in the form of a spider web in Apple. It was stabilized with PledgeTM to allow finer carving of the web filaments. Other parts were steam bent before stabilizing and final sanding.


-a bowl in Oak burl that had a lot of punky areas. These were stabilized

with Pledge to allow cutting and sanding.

Don Moore


created a turned and carved piece turned on multiple centres then carved to the final shape

Jim Diamond created a small lidded box


