



Norm Jolivet has a set of crochet hooks and handle kit from PSI in the raffle tonight along with other goodies.



16th. The event was organized by **Jean Louis Bourque** and **Mike Parker.** It was a well-attended and interesting seminar with 6 demonstrations by 5 presenters over the course of the day. Congratulations to Jean Louis and Mike on a very successful event.

We were unable to get enough volunteers to cover any particular time slot for a demo table at the Craft NS Christmas Show this past weekend, so the Executive made the decision to withdraw for this year and will place this item on the agenda for the September meeting. Members were reminded that one of the first items in the Guild's Articles of Incorporation is the promotion of the art and craft of wood turning and all members need to be stepping up for opportunities for promotions like this.

## Guest Speaker

#### Main Presentation: Ford's Awesome Duplicator – Richard Ford

Richard presented an overview of the lathe duplicator he developed to allow him to make numerous identical pieces. He demonstrated the set up and use of the duplicator while making a chess pawn by copying an original model he had made.

The inspiration for his "Ford's Awesome Duplicator" came from his buffing table that he created to make buffing pieces more comfortable and safer. It consists of a small table rest mounted in the banjo of his


lathe and Richard demonstrated its use last year.

### The Duplicator

In use, accurate duplication of pieces depends on careful set up and alignment. Richard has incorporated a number of features to make accurate set up easier. Richard's duplicator consists of:

a wood table that straddles the lathe bed; a pair of centres that hold the original piece above the blank;

a tool holder that slides on the table and does the cutting.





The table has keys on the bottom edge of the sides that fit into the channel in the lathe bed, with small feet in each corner that prevent damage to the keys when the table is stored on a shelf. It is secured to the bed of the lathe with a bolt and nut through the bottom, clamping it to the lathe bed.

On the top of the table, a key running parallel to the lathe axis aligns a pair of centres that are used to hold the original or 'model' piece

exactly above the axis of the lathe where the blank for the duplicate will be turned. The use of centres to hold the model allows duplicating an already turned piece rather than using a flat template to duplicate a profile.

A robust metal free sliding tool holder is used to hold a cutting tool at the same height as the lathe centre. Richard uses a cutter with a flat-top gouge profile in various shapes depending on the task. The tool holder has a plastic base to allow it to slide easily in the table surface. A steel stylus is mounted in the top of the tool holder centred at the height of the 'model' piece above the headstock. The stylus must be the same shape as the cutter and the tip of the stylus must be

aligned exactly above the tip of the cutter so that the cutter will follow the stylus exactly to get accurate duplication.

#### Making the 'Model'

Design and draw out your desired profile at full scale. Richard uses a drafting software to sketch and refine the shape then prints out the profile at exactly 1:1 scale.

Laminate the paper then cut out the printed profile.

Secure the profile to the tool rest so that desired diameters for the shape can be transferred directly to the work-piece as it is being shaped.

Turn and finish the piece as desired.

## **Using the Duplicator**

- 1. The turned 'model' piece is mounted between the two copy centres. If duplicating small pieces such as chess pieces, the model is mounted on a steel shaft that is then mounted in the copy centre above the headstock of the lathe.
- 2. The blank to be turned is mounted between the lathe centres. For small pieces, Richard secured a small blank to a steel shaft and this is mounted in a collet chuck on the headstock of the lathe.
- 3. With the lathe running at high speed, slide the tool holder along the table and begin to cut away excess wood, watching the space between the stylus and the model.
- 4. As you get close to the final shape, cut slowly and make sure the tool holder is meeting the work piece at 90 degrees to the lathe axis to get accurate duplication.
- 5. Use a smoothing scraper to refine transitions and remove tool marks. (Richard also made a tool holder to secure the scraper exactly at the centre line height of the lathe.)
- 6. Sand the piece and apply sanding sealer.
- 7. Polish with a polishing paste such as Richard's NovaSilk
- 8. Apply the desired finish. Richard used beeswax for the chess piece being made.

Jim Kuzma Showed off several nice pieces resulting from recent work in his shop:


> Two live edge vases in White Birch with turned tulip flowers A bottle vase in Maple with tulip flowers

> A Bravery Beads box in Pine, Mahogany, Cherry and Walnut A small bowl in Cherry burl

A bowl turned from a chunk of salvaged firewood

Two puzzles, a golf ball in a block and a golf tee in a board he helped his grandchildren make

A tea light holder with bark inclusions



Lowell Jenkins presented a small tea light holder turned from some very spalted firewood. The wood was stabilized with CA glue for turning some of the softer areas in the wood.


#### **Stuart Taylor**

showed a small vase in Cherry burl with voids filled with sawdust and CA glue. Once shaped, and sanded, Stuart

attached the rim to a jamb chuck with hot melt glue in order to turn and finish the base. Glue stick for use in turning must be flexible enough to bend when cold or the glue will be too brittle and can fail on the lathe



Gordon Marshall showed off a large 'platter bowl' in Cherry burl with live edges on the bowl and platter. A crack in the end of the platter was secured with copper wire 'stitching'.
