

Show & Tell

"The Core of the Matter" Dianne Looker

I have been planning for some time to make one of the pieces I submitted in the competition this year. I was initially inspired by a photo in the American Woodturner, in the "From our members" section. It was a turning made of "slots" – the outside edges formed the outside of an object (I think an engine – it was quite a while ago) and inside the part between the slots created another image.

I tried doing that, turning a small vase shape with two outlines created by the outer and inner lines. I was mostly pleased with the result but knew the technique needed some refining, as you can see in the photo. In this case the outline was hard to see, and it was very difficult to sand and finish the



insides.

This year, I decided to make an apple – showing the outer edge and (inside) the inner "core". There was a lot of time and effort put into the design. I practiced with varying thickness of slots and of spaces between the slots. If the slots themselves were not wide enough, you couldn't really see the outer shape. If they were too wide and/or the spaces between the slots were too narrow, you couldn't see the inner shape.

Once the thicknesses were established, the challenge was creating the piece. The earlier vase was done with one solid piece of wood, cutting the spaces very carefully to create the inner shape. This time I decided to physically separate the

slices while the block of wood was

square. This meant (a) carefully marking each piece and its orientation, and (b) having "extra" pieces that were turned away to create the core. I decided to use spalted apple – apple to make an apple. I liked the earthy look and feel of the spalted wood, although its softer texture created some turning challenges. And the clear spalting lines meant I had to be very careful lining up the pieces.

Then I had to devise a way of holding the pieces on the lathe. I had drilled a hole down the middle of the whole piece and used that as a support.

First I turned the outside to create the apple shape I wanted. Then, I removed every other piece and replaced them with the "extras" I had cut. Carefully remounting it, I then turned the inner core.

Once that was done, I removed the "extra" slices, and had the turned outer pieces alternating with the turned inner core pieces. Using the careful marks I had created earlier, I lined up each piece and glued them together. The dowel that had been used for support on the lathe held the pieces in alignment, and filled the drilled hole. A "stem" cut and inserted in the top, and burn lines at the bottom of the dowel, and the piece was complete.

I was very pleased with the result. And while it certainly could be improved, it did earn me third prize in the open spindle class. It is now displayed at eye level in my house, so you can see the "core of the matter".
