All together we had 15 pieces entered by eight turners compared to 40 pieces submitted by 17 turners in the previous competition. The entry fees raised \$75 with a further \$140 in donations to Feed NS.

Scott Manor House Show and Sale Gary L and Bill M



Scott Manor House (SMH) invited the Guild to hold demos of woodturning and conduct a show and sale of turnings in their premises from August 23 to August 26. On August 22 we set up the display of turnings in the main house and the turning demonstration in the garage outside. Gary Landry, Bill Maes, Calum Ewing and Bob Earle, provided the demonstrations and supervised the sale, while Jim Diamond couriered the Guild's mini-lathe to the show and back. Twelve bowls were provided by Edmund Benoit for the sale while other turnings were provided by Calum, Bill, Gary and Bob along with leftovers from the Christmas sale of last year.

Each day from 10 AM to 4 PM the show and sale was open and on the Wednesday, Thursday and Friday a demo was held from 2 PM to 4 PM. Unfortunately rain cancelled the demo on the Saturday. In fact, a lot of the time we were at SMH was during periods of rain or impending rain which probably accounted for the low foot traffic into the SMH and, as a result, our sales. We did however speak to a few potential new members who were keen to learn about woodturning and they were fully informed of the benefits of joining the Guild. Business cards were handed out to all who were willing to take one. Hopefully we will see some benefits from this outreach program.

An unexpected benefit of being at SMH came about when CTV was on site to report on another matter and they decided to tape some "B Roll" using our display and Calum's demonstration outside. They made no promises but said it may be on the evening news that day or the next as filler between other items. As it turned out, the tape was played that evening and, although it was only 10 or so seconds long, it was great exposure for the Guild in general and our show and sale in particular.

Low foot traffic impacted sales. In total we sold \$167 worth of turnings from which we paid SMH \$17 in commission, leaving a total of \$150 to put in our Guild account. Thank you to all who set up and participated in the sale and the demos.

We have been invited to come back for the SMH's Celebration of Lights to be held in November (as well as an invitation to come back to SMH next summer). Since we have already decided to attend a Christmas craft sale somewhere this year this may be the answer we are seeking for a venue. We await their proposal and conditions to be sent to us so that we can make a more rational decision to attend or to pass. One distinct advantage to SMH, if I interpret the verbal offer made to us correctly, is that our cost to attend would be on a sliding scale. The more we sell the more we would pay SMH in commissions (about 10%) whereas at a craft market we would pay a flat fee (say \$150 to \$500) whether we sold only \$10 or \$1000 worth of items. There would be no demonstrations but we could promote the Guild to all attendees.

The Executive will keep the membership informed along the way.

DaveM's Fireside Chat

Greetings to a new fiscal year! For the NWG Newsletter, I decided this year that I would do a regular monthly column for the newsletter. In this space I hope to talk about my history in wood turning, (some of the most interesting parts anyway) and hopefully others will write in to me to include some of their early experiences as well. I hope to maybe do some interviewer (me) chat sessions with some of the membership that will reflect their role in making the Guild what it is. In addition, I hope to bring forward some new and exciting (at least for me) ideas I have come across or developed.

This all is coming about because I am going to be missing all of the meetings for the next four or five months, and the Guild is so important to me that I want to keep contributing to it in whatever way I can. I haven't told everyone up to this point but it is time now to do so... Just ahead of the June AGM I found out that a small (10mm) basal cell tumour, that was supposed to be removable with a surgical gastro-endoscope, had developed into Stage 3 esophageal cancer and was quite aggressive. I have spent the month of August in a daily radiation regime with chemotherapy once a week. I finished this round of treatment on the 7th of September. I have done relatively well with all of this considering but the cumulative effects of the radiation continue for a few weeks. So, at the moment my energy levels are quite low. If the treatment was successful, I will undergo an eight hour surgery to remove the lower half of my esophagus and pull the stomach up into the thoracic cavity to reattach to the remaining esophagus. There is a three-month recovery from the operation so I will be out of action until mid-winter. This will be my way of contributing to the Guild. I have been in the Guild for about 10 years now and jumped right in after my first year, getting on the executive and holding various positions there ever since. I really believe in the Guild and what it stands for and what it can do for the membership in general... but it does take all of us participating in some way to make the experience for ourselves and others more meaningful. This can even be just bringing in something that you have done and talk about it at show and tell. Whether you are a Novice or Master Class turner, contributing to the collective experience is important. For new members: talk to older members find out if there are other members near you that you can go for a coffee with or visit their shops, etc. Veteran members: see if any of the new members are in your area and hold impromptu get-togethers outside of the regular Guild meetings. Take someone new under your wing or just get to know them better. After the pandemic we lost some members and comradery that has been in the Guild for so many years, it is time to build that back.


Enough of that! The item I wanted to bring forward to everyone is that William Wood-Write is now carrying Beaufort pen kits out of the UK. These are exceptionally well-made products and platings... you can see the quality in them. In the past I have ordered some fountain pen parts and kits from Beaufort directly, but as they are in the UK, with the exchange and shipping it is very cost prohibitive to get them. I am here to tell you that they are very reasonably priced at WWW and should be considered if you are looking for some quality kits. Figure 1 shows the Headwind Pen Kit.




The other thing is their bushings are exceptionally well made and have both a 60° bevel (which means you can mount them between centers), as well as wear bar indicators; see Figure 2. (I always link up my bushing sets with a small bead-chain so when your box of bushings suddenly leaves the work surface to the floor at least the bushing pairs are together).



If you haven't tried turning between centers without a mandrel you are in for a treat. The turned blanks are totally centered and never offset or out of round. To accomplish this, use a MT2 60° drive center in the headstock, with a corresponding MT2 60° live center in the tailstock (or whatever Morse taper is needed for your lathe). Move the tailstock up to the headstock so the points align, they should be in line both vertically and horizontally; if they are not you need to adjust the two stocks so they do align, as in Figure 3.



Then simply back the tailstock up to allow the blank and bushings to go over the points and tighten everything up with the tailstock hand crank — friction drives it all, and the tapers keep it all aligned, no need to worry about flexing mandrels. Figure 4 shows a Headwind blank and bushings mounted on the lathe ready to turn.



So you tried out using between center turning and you really like it, but only Beaufort bushings have this feature. So, what about the other twenty bushing sets you have for all the other pen/mandrel projects you turn? Don't worry, William Wood-Write also has another new product on offer: a Canadian CNC-machined set of stainless-steel adapters that turn your older >7mm bushings into between center bushings; see Figure 5.




To use these adapters simply slide your original bushings over the shaft extensions. Then mount both the adapter and bushing into the blank as per Figure 6 and mount everything between centers.



I bought a set and gave them a try and found they worked great. That being said, the 7mm bushings that are used for all of the projects using a 7mm OD brass tube won't work in these unless the bushings are very short, leaving enough shaft remaining to engage the blank 7mm tube effectively. An option for kits using 7mm OD brass sleeves might be to make a special bushing of the appropriate final diameter with an integral stub like the ones on offer from William Wood-Write and a center drilled 60° taper. (Next month I will include a photo of such a bushing). Write to me and let me know what 7mm brass sleeve projects you make the most of.
